- 00:00 [So, *what is the most interesting job you've had and what made it so?*]  
So, the most interesting job I had was a few years ago when I worked in one of Budapest's independent theatres. And I worked in this quite interesting big production and I worked as an interpreter for a choreographer from the UK.
- 00:27 And this production involved like a lot of like dance and like acrobatics and stuff like that. So, some of the, some of the acrobats were actually children who did not speak very good English and some of the actors, dancers weren't proficient enough. So, I was the choreographer's interpreter.
- 00:53 And this was super interesting because I do know about theatre and theatre productions, but I don't know or actually I did not know much about dance, contemporary dance, stage dance. So, there was a lot of vocabulary I had to pick up and it wasn't just that, but when I was her interpreter, I also sort of had to become her because you kind of have to, I don't know, mimic the personality of the person you're interpreting for.

So, on that theme then, what makes the job attractive to you?*] So, creativity would definitely be the number one thing that I mention. Money these days is also something that does attract me.
- 01:55 But most of all, I think creativity and independence in my position. So now I work as a content creator, a designer. I edit videos, I design e-learning courses. So, what I really enjoy about this job is it's mostly like 95% working from home.

Obviously, I do have a boss, but as long as the deadlines are met and everything is going smoothly, communication wise, and so on and so forth, I decide when my working hours are. [*Brilliant, brilliant. Okay, so if you had the opportunity to turn back the clock, what career might you have followed and why?*
